Background

- The SUPPORT Act (P.L. 115-271) mandated the report
- Directs the Secretary to analyze and report on:
 - best practices.
 - barriers and potential solutions,
 - differences in utilization and cost.
 - avoidable inpatient admissions and readmissions,
 - quality, and
 - satisfaction with telehealth for SUD services for children with Medicaid coverage.

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Findings: Knowledge and data gaps

- There are knowledge gaps about the use of telehealth for SUD services for pediatric populations
- Findings pertain to telehealth for behavioral health or general health services



Findings: Best practices

- Best practices for tele-behavioral health that could apply to pediatric SUD services include:
 - Ensuring organizational readiness
 - Engaging staff
 - Using synchronous modalities
 - Using support staff
 - Using telehealth in school-based programs

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Findings: Differences between telehealth and in-person visits

- Utilization varies by population and location in general, but there were no studies comparing telehealth and in-person
- Costs may be comparable to in-person services, but data on total cost of care or savings are lacking
- Data are limited, but some studies show mixed results on use of urgent care or emergency department visits
- Quality is similar to face-to-face care
- Satisfaction appears to be favorable but depends on patient and provider access to and views on technology, and for patients, demographics



Findings: Barriers and solutions

- Payment policy
- Lack of technology
- Acceptance of telehealth
- Workforce and capacity constraints
- Licensure and credentialing
- Other barriers

- Information on state Medicaid approaches for using telehealth
